Council Meeting December 6, 2022, 6:00 PM

A. Called to Order

Having a quorum, the Regular Council meeting was called to order by Mayor Randy Gawith at 6:00 PM. Council members present were Councilor Tegan Kaneaster, Councilor Derek Turner, and Councilor Vernon Sandy. Councilor Paula Evoniuk and Councilor Aliina Kirby attended via phone conferencing. Councilor Raymond Doherty was absent. Department Heads present were Police Chief William Caldera, City Recorder Teri Bacus and Public Works Director Steve Draper. Citizens present were Ray Bacus, Rhonda Lazinka, Tiffany Schademan, Steve Haddock and Craig Erickson.

City Recorder requests to add recently received election results to the agenda. Councilor Turner made a motion to approve adding the election results to the agenda and Councilor Kaneaster seconded. Councilor Sandy voted yes, Councilor Evoniuk voted yes, and Councilor Kirby voted yes. Motion carried: 5 Yes – 0 No

City Recorder requests to add upgrading #2 sewer lift station to the agenda. Councilor Turner made a motion to approve adding the upgrade of #2 sewer lift station to the agenda and Councilor Kaneaster seconded. Councilor Sandy voted yes, Councilor Evoniuk voted yes, and Councilor Kirby voted yes. Motion carried: 5 Yes – 0 No

Citizen Craig Erickson asked about ordinances related to recreational vehicles (RV) being lived in on residential property. He lives next door to a lot that had a home destroyed in a fire. Currently there are three RVs on the lot and at least two are being lived in. Chief Caldera answered that he has spoken to the property owner and explained that only one occupied RV is permitted per lot. The owner stated to him that the other RVs were not occupied. He recommended to Craig to document findings and take pictures or videos if someone is living in more than one RV. If he discovers that more than one RV is being lived in, take the documentation to the Chief.

F. ACTION ITEMS

F-1 Industrial Property Partition Hearing – Mayor Gawith opened a public hearing for an industrial property partition. City Recorder explains that City Council approved the sale of 12 acres to Hayden Contracting. This public hearing is for the partition of the 12 acres located at the southeast corner of

the industrial property. Surveyor Steve Haddock drafted the tentative partition and was present to answer any questions. He states that there is already 30 feet at the bottom or south side of the property near circle road. We will be adding an additional 20 feet on the north side of the road because there is an existing water line. It crosses the property and services the Bike Pit area. We are completing the partition with water rights. The county road is sixty feet with 30 feet on each side. Councilor Turner made a motion to approve the industrial property partition and Councilor Sandy seconded. Councilor Kaneaster voted yes, Councilor Kirby voted yes, and Councilor Evoniuk voted yes. Motion carried: 5 Yes – 0 No

F-2 Official Election Results – City Recorder provided a copy of the official November 8, 2022, election results. For the Mayor position, Randy Gawith and for City Councilor positions, elected is Teagan Kaneaster, Rhonda Lazinka, and Tiffany Schademan. Councilor Turner made a motion to accept the official election results and Councilor Sandy seconded. Councilor Kaneaster voted yes, Councilor Evoniuk voted yes, and Councilor Kirby voted yes. Motion carried: 5 Yes – 0 No

F-3 Sewer Lift Station Upgrade - Public Works Director Steve Draper requested to upgrade #2 sewer lift station which is located on the north side of Elm Street. The station was built in 1978 and is currently not functioning and parts are no longer available. It is a small lift station and takes care of approximately 20-25 homes. He presented a quote from one company in the amount of nearly \$113,000. He met with another company from La Grande, and they can repair the lift station in about 3 days for about \$30,000 less. He requested \$85,000 to cover the costs to rehab the station. Both quotes were reviewed, and the differences were discussed. He would like to use COVID grant funds to assist in the costs. Councilor Sandy made a motion to approve spending up to \$85,000 to upgrade the #2 sewer lift station near Elm Street and Councilor Turner seconded. Councilor Kaneaster asked about specific equipment and parts availability. City Recorder asked where the funds will be from and PW Director states, he would like to use COVID grant funds for half and the other half would come from the Sewer Utility Reserve Fund. Councilor Kaneaster voted yes, Councilor Evoniuk voted yes, and Councilor Kirby voted yes. Motion carried: 5 Yes – 0 No

Councilor Turner made a motion to use COVID grant funds for half of the costs and the other half will be funded from the Sewer Utility Reserve Fund. Councilor Sandy seconded. Councilor Kaneaster voted yes, Councilor Evoniuk voted yes, and Councilor Kirby voted yes. Motion carried: 5 Yes - 0 No

G-1 Department Head Report – Chief Caldera provided an update on the open police officer position stating that he met someone a couple of weeks ago that is already certified. Unfortunately, the applicant is applying for other positions as well and he has not heard anything. Another interview board will be scheduled in January 2023. PW Director Steve Draper states that the city was approved for \$250,000 in grant funds from the Oregon Department of Transportation to repair roads. City Hall:
