Next Council Meeting March 1, 2016

The following topics were discussed at the February 16, 2016, Council meeting:

1. Council approved free notary for non-profits.
2. City Engineers reported to Council on the recent One Stop funding meeting and DEQ meeting. Considering all the information offered, Council chose one option for the required wastewater facility upgrade. (see article)
3. Council approved the 2017 Budget Calendar.
4. Council approve a purchase of a control box for the sewer lift station.
5. Council approved the employment contract for Chief Caldera. Final signing to be March 1, 2016.

UNAUTHORIZED DUMPING AT THE BURN PILE, THREATENS TO SHUT DOWN THE BURN PILE

Currently the citizens of Pilot Rock enjoy the privilege of taking their burnable yard debris to the "Burn Pile" up on NW Cedar. It is free and has been a benefit to many of our residents who otherwise would have to take their debris into Pendleton and pay a fee.

COUNCIL SETTLES ON OPTION #5 FOR THE REQUIRED LAGOON UPGRADE

After months and months of meetings and work sessions trying to sort out what is the best option to satisfy the DEQ required waste water facility upgrade, Council has reached a decision. Meetings with the funding agencies and DEQ helped shine a light on the best option.

Our current lagoon system exists of a primary lagoon where waste water is treated to get rid of odor and any bad stuff, it then spills over into the secondary lagoon where it is allowed to seep. The City has had a permit for this type of lagoon system for some 50 years. In December of 2013 and January 2014 we had high hits of fecal coliform in a downstream monitoring well. That is what prompted the DEQ warning letter dated March of 2014, which stated that the "City must submit a facilities plan to identify and select options to upgrade the sewage treatment lagoons to prevent further degradation of groundwater".

LIBRARY ONLINE RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO BUSINESSES

Employers wanting or needing employees to improve their computer skills can get help through their local public library in Umatilla County. All 12 libraries in the County have *LearningExpress Library* which offers unlimited, 24/7, internet based, access to skill-building, interactive courses, including instruction in the use of Microsoft Office Suite.

The "Popular Software Tools" section in the "Computer Skills Center" has separate lessons for the widely used Excel, Outlook, PowerPoint, Publisher, and Word. In addition, lessons for lesser used Office Suites programs including Access, Project, and Visio are also available. Each course allows users to choose the version of the program they are wishing to learn (e.g. Word 2010, Word 2013). It should be noted the most current versions of each program are not yet available. *LearningExpress Library* allows users to begin at their current level - whether starting at beginning, intermediate or advanced levels.

Connecting to *LearningExpress Library* is easy. Links to the site are available on each of the local libraries websites. After establishing a login and password, users have access to the Office Suite courses, plus all the other courses that are offered. If necessary, the local libraries are available to assist in setting up an account.

Burn

Recently a dump truck load of roofing material was discovered dumped at our burn pile, much of this material was not burnable or permitted to be burned so the Pilot Rock public works department had to take on the arduous task of sorting through the load and hauling off, at the City's expense, what could not be burned. We ask our citizens to help us protect the privilege of the use of the burn pile. Only wood (free of metal) and yard debris is permitted to be dumped. No plastic bags. Keys to the Burn Pile are available at City Hall Monday through Friday 8am-5pm, and Saturday and Sunday at the Hardware Store. You will be asked to sign the key out and employees will inspect your load. Please be sure the gate is locked again when you leave and please report any suspicious dumping to City Hall 443-2811.



Upgrade

Anderson Perry, Staff and Council came up with options to do just that. Included in these plans were the needed improvements to the waste water collection system to resolve the infiltration and inflow problem, as well as abandoning the existing lift station and installing a new gravity sewer interceptor pipeline, eliminating annual maintenance to the pumps, piping, valves, generator, electrical, etc. Also included is the cost of replacing the existing primary lagoon inlet pipe and valve. These improvements are estimated to cost approximately \$780,000 and are included in the estimated cost of each option. After narrowing the options from four down to two, a plan with both options was submitted to DEQ for review.

After their review of the Waste Water Facility Plan, DEQ returned a letter with review comments for the two options. Option #4, was a plan to keep the lagoons where they are, and purchase additional land giving us the space needed to enlarge and line the secondary lagoons so that they would evaporate the water rather than allow it to seep. This option has an estimated cost of \$5.362 million. DEQ's review comments now reveal that given the proximity of the lagoons to Birch Creek, they are requiring that the primary lagoon must be lined as well. This would add another \$1.1million to the project. Option #1, was a plan to pump the treated waste water from our existing primary lagoon to a new evaporative lagoon located where the OHV Park is now. The estimated cost of this option is \$4.432 million. DEQ's review comments had indicated that there may be some cause for concern because of the new evaporative lagoons proximity to Mt. Judy (a wood waste landfill). This option would also require an additional \$1.1 million to line the existing primary lagoon.

With both options not passing muster, Council asked Brad Baird of Anderson Perry (engineers), to arrange a meeting with DEQ to determine exactly what they are requiring. The meeting on February 16, was attended by Councilors Perkins and Doherty, Mayor Carnes, Teri Porter, Steve Draper, Brad Baird and Jadon Herron of Anderson Perry and four members of DEQ. During this meeting we learned that DEQ acknowledges that all liners leak, and while in most circumstances they allow for a certain percentage of leakage, they cannot permit any leakage that could possibly wind up in Birch Creek. **Continued on 1B**

Upgrade

So that pretty much took option #4 out of the running. When discussing option #1, they expressed their concerns locating a lagoon so close to the wood waste landfill (Mt. Judy). Monitoring wells would be required. The issue being once again that all liners leak, if water from the evaporative lagoon were to leak into the landfill it would increase decomposition, and get into the ground water. We were flatly told "it is a bad idea". So that pretty much took option #1 off the table.

Anticipating this outcome, Council had asked Draper, Baird and Herron to come up with an alternative which was presented to DEQ. This option, #5, would locate two approximately 7.5 acre lined treatment lagoons and one 40 acre lined evaporative lagoon, just north of the OHV park. Being away from Birch Creek and the wood waste landfill, this option would not be a risk to the ground water, or the creek and would not require monitoring wells, a savings of about \$12,000 a year. This option is anticipated to cost \$5.1 million. DEQ was pleased with this option which also eliminates the risk of additional environmental regulations.

At the last Council meeting on February 16, 2016, Council was presented with the info from the DEQ meeting and option #5. Council was also given the results of the One Stop meeting that was held on February 10, 2016. In attendance were Councilors Perkins and Doherty, Mayor Carnes, Steve Draper, Teri Porter, Brad Baird and representatives from the lending agencies (IFA, USDA, DEQ, CWSRF, CDBG). The meeting revealed grants and interest rates available from each, as well as what each resident of Pilot Rock would need to pay monthly for sewer, to qualify. The required monthly resident sewer rates varied from \$41 up to \$53, grants varied from \$300,000 to \$1.4 million and terms of the loan varied from 25-40 years. At first glance Council is most interested in USDA who would offer up to \$1.4 million in grants (depending on the size of the loan), the required monthly sewer rates were the lowest at \$41, but the term of the loan would be 40 years. Council and Staff is hopeful to pay off the loan sooner, maybe in 30 years with the right financial plan. Grant funds are first come first serve, so time is of the essence. Council motioned to move forward with option #5 and start the application process for USDA. That gave Anderson Perry the green light to add option #5 to the Waste Water Facility Plan and resubmit to DEQ for final approval. We will also start the application process for funding with USDA.

There will be a work session held on March 1, 2016, at 6pm just before the Council meeting. Brad Baird will be present to outline the plan for option #5. Also in attendance will be Heidi Williams and John Strough of DEQ, to help explain why using the existing bike pit is not a good option and help us move forward with option #5. The public is welcome to attend.





WHAT TO BRING

From your workbench:

Adhesives, glues, resins, hobby supplies, artist supplies, oil paints, latex paints, stains, thinners, stripper, polishes

From your garage:

Car batteries, dry cell batteries, engine degreasers, brake fluids, antifreeze, AC refrigerants, transmission fluids, motor oil, waste fuels (diesel, gasoline).

From your yard:

Insecticides, weed killers, poisons, pesticides, fungicides, propane tanks or cylinders, swimming pool chemicals, wood preservatives, driveway sealer.

From your house:

Aerosol cans, lighter fluid, cleaners, spot removers, bleach, computers, electronic equipment, hearing aid batteries, NiCad batteries, photo chemicals, chemistry sets, home heating oil, thermometers, fluorescent light bulbs, batteries, kerosene.
